FORMER HINTONIAN, DR. EDWARD E. ROSE, DIES IN HUNTINGTON

Funeral services will be held at 10:30 a.m. Saturday for Dr. Edward E. Rose, 74, a former prominent Hinton physician. Rose died at his home in Huntington Wednesday night following an extended illness.

Services will be held at the Klingel-Carpenter Mortuary with Dr. S. Roger Tyler officiating. Burial will follow in the Spring Hill Cemetery.

Dr. Rose, a member of a pioneer Hinton family, was born here May 14, 1883 and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Rose.

Following graduation from Hinton High School, he took his pre-medical work at V.P.I., Blacksburg, before entering the University of Maryland where he received his M.D. degree.

After practicing medicine in Hinton for several years, he went to Huntington in 1918 where he was associated in practice with Dr. Karl Prichard.

He served as an officer in World War II and later returned to Huntington to continue his practice until 1955 when he was named Superintendent of the Andrew S. Rowan Memorial Home at Sweet Springs. Ill health

forced him to retire from that position in 1956.

During World War II, Dr. Rose was awarded a presidential certificate for his work at the Cabell County Induction Center.

He was a member of the American Medical Association, Cabell County Medical Society, Elks lodge and the American Legion.

Survivors include: his widow, the former Margaret Ford of Talcott; one son, Edward E. Rose, Jr., of Huntington; one sister, Mrs. Carl Van Zandt of Huntington; and a brother, John Rose of Beckley.
